The 12 Traditions of A.A.

In 12-step groups, there is no such thing as individual authority. No one member "directs" or "controls" the actions of the other members of the group.

Tradition 2. For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority - a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience. Our leaders are but trusted servants; they do not govern.

Group decisions are just that, group decisions. After a discussion of all aspects of a given situation, including the minority opinion, the group votes on the issue and an agreement is reached with the majority vote. This vote is called a "group conscience."

Each group is a fellowship of equals. No matter what an individual member's background, education, or professional expertise, no member has authority "over" the group. In this way, the fellowship reaches out to all who would seek its comfort and provides the atmosphere of a sense of "belonging" to all members.

But there are leaders...

This tradition has been misquoted many times as "we have no leaders." But it clearly states that each group does have its leaders, they just have no authority over the rest of the group. Whether they be the group's representative to the area or district, or the secretary or treasurer, they have been entrusted with the responsibility to serve the group, not make decisions for it.

Groups clearly have other "leaders" also. There are those, who by sharing their wisdom and strength in the meetings, who are quietly recognized by the group as "spiritual leaders." There are those members, who are so well-founded in the principles and traditions of the program, the group turns to when questions arise

involving possible violations of those principles and traditions. These too are leaders, but they do not govern either.

Here is a story of a visitor to this site who has shared their experience with tradition 2:

Wendy

A Group Conscience as Necessary

It was one of those memorable meetings that we are sometimes privileged to attend. In Australia, people do not volunteer to speak at an <u>Alcoholics Anonymous</u> meeting but are called by name or are pointed to by the chairperson. A few pass by simply saying that they will "just identify" with their name and the fact that they are an alcoholic, but most come up to the front and have a go at sharing.

The person in the chair was an Aussie bloke who called mostly males only to speak. After the first few men spoke the females were getting restless after the next few guys spoke, some of the women got really agitated, and then after a few more mostly male calls, one of the women literally exploded.

She stood up and shouted "No! That's it, you sexist pig! Are we invisible? Not worth hearing?" Our chairperson said: "Look, I'm in the chair and I'll call whoever I am moved to pick and it isn't you so sit down and respect the meeting!"

Uh, oh! Not exactly the right thing to say to this feminist former street person in recovery! In her wrath, she made a beeline for the chairperson with obvious homicidal intent! Others cheered or jeered as pandemonium erupted.

An old-timer jumped up, raised hands high and yelled "Group Conscience, Group Conscience..." like a



How to Share in a Meeting

- 1. **Part of sharing is sharing time**. Give others a chance to share. Three minutes is all it should take to carry the message at meeting level. (Humility and Service Steps 7 & 12)
- 2. If you share a problem, also share the solution. (Hope, Faith, Integrity and Service Steps 2, 3, 5 and 12)
- 3. Sharing IS carrying the message and that means sharing about a spiritual principle or step. (Hope, Faith and Service Steps 2, 3 & 12 and Traditions 1, 5 and 11)
- 4. If God wants you to share someone will call on you. (Faith, Integrity and Humility Steps 3, 5 and 7)
- 5. When you have very little to say, then say very little. Do not start by saying, "I really don't have much to say", and then ramble for the next 15 minutes. It is selfish and it blocks others from sharing the real message by taking up valuable meeting time. Brevity is the hallmark of efficacy. (Courage, Integrity, Willingness, Humility and Service Steps 4, 5, 6, 7 and 12)
- 6. A 12 Step meeting is not group therapy,

- counseling, church or a garbage dump. This is the place to carry the message of recovery, not spread your disease. You are there to carry God's message, not your own. We are, at best, vessels for the message of a loving Higher Power. (Hope, Faith, Humility, Brotherly Love, Spirituality and Service Steps 2, 3, 7, 8, 11 and 12 and Traditions 5 and 11)
- 7. After you share do not get up and walk right out. Set an example for the newcomers. (Willingness, Humility, Brotherly Love and Service Steps 6, 7, 8 and 12)
- 8. If you can't get to the meeting on time you have surrendered your right to share. (Willingness, Humility and Service Steps 6, 7 and 12 and Tradition 11)



9. A Step or topic meeting is about that Step or topic. It is not about you. If you know little or nothing about the Step or topic then do not share. (Honesty, Integrity, Humility – Steps 1, 5 and 7)

momentary silence fell.

"Tradition two on the banner there indicates that I was a member of this group can call for a Group Conscience meeting at any time and I call for one right now!"

The woman was asked: "Please state your case to us all". She did. She said that fairness required that women speakers alternate with men until the females had all had a chance to either pass or speak.

The man in the chair was then asked to please state his case. He said that he had determined that there were five times more men in the room than women so he thought that it would be fair to call on women onefifth of the time.

Others were asked for any other comments. There chant. A few others picked up the chant and a were a few more women who felt slighted and only one friend of the chairman who agreed with him. A moment of silent reflection was called for, to ask our respective higher powers to guide us in voting and then all were asked to close their eyes except for the aggrieved woman and the chairman who would together count the raised hands for each method.

> The woman's "boy-girl" alternative method was obviously overwhelmingly approved and we all settled down for a lovely second part of the meeting.

> It's not the first time I have seen a "Group Conscience" called for during a meeting but it was the most dramatic.

- 10. If you share you should also contribute to the 7th Tradition. (Integrity, Willingness, Humility, Brotherly Love, Spirituality and Service – Steps 5, 6, 7, 8, 11 and 12 and Traditions 1 and 7)
- 11. Do not call on yourself. This is rude. This is not recovery. If you feel powerfully moved to share then politely attract the attention of the chairperson and wait to be recognized. (Honesty, Faith, Integrity, Willingness, Humility, Brotherly Love, Spirituality and Service - Steps 1, 3, 5, 6, 7, 8, 11 and 12 and Traditions 1, 2, 5, 9, 11 and 12)

This is by no means a comprehensive list of guidelines. "God will constantly disclose more to you and to us."

Furthermore, I have not been able to maintain anything like 'perfect adherence' to these principles. I have been able to share the message more effectively when I have been able to stay close to these guidelines and when I ask God to work through me to help the next sick and suffering alcoholic/addict.

"Which tire was flat?"



WHO WAS HANK G. PARKHURST?

In 2019, Central Recovery Press published William H. Schaberg's Writing the Big Book. This 761 page tome is the author's attempt to trace the history of the writing of the book, Alcoholics Anonymous. At the same time, the author discovered and documented many myths surrounding the early history of the Big Book.

But what is fascinating about this historical research book is the role that Hank G. Parkhurst played in the formulation of the Big Book as well as the AA Foundation.

Parkhurst was a very close friend of Bill W. At one time, during the 1930's, Parkhurst's salary was \$40,000, an astonishing amount during the Great Depression. However, Parkhurst lost that salary due to his alcoholism and it was Bill Wilson who helped Hank get sober. Parkhurst was a man of ideas as well as a promotor. In fact, according to Schaberg, Hank was a bigger promoter than Bill himself.

So what was so special about Hank Parkhurst? According to Schaberg, Parkhurst could be considered the real cofounder of Alcoholics Anonymous. In fact, it was Parkhurst who first coined the term "Alcoholics Anonymous." Parkhurst also prodded Bill into putting down the philosophy of getting sober in the form of a book. It was Parkhurst who also gave Bill an outline of what he thought should be included in the book even though the titles for the chapters in the first 164 pages were conceived by Bill. Parkhurst was also the man who felt the need to form a non-profit foundation to carry on the work of helping people recover from alcoholism. Hank was a consummate idea man, so much so that he often scribbled notes, ideas, suggestions that were hard to fully understand. Bill was much more deliberate. He took Parkhurst's ideas, notes and suggestions and translated them into intelligible form. Parkhurst and other early New York recovering alcoholics made suggestions for the book that never were used by Bill. For example, Parkhurst insisted on the need for a Q & A chapter, something Bill never considered. But it was Parkhurst that got Bill writing his story and the chapter

"There Is A Solution". These two early chapters became the basis for which both Bill and Hank used to promote the idea that came to be known as the Big Book.

So why isn't Hank G. Parkhurst considered the cofounder of Alcoholics Anonymous? The reason is because Parkhurst never stayed sober. Neither did Ebby. So, according to Schaberg, Dr. Bob got that title, co-founder, by default. Dr. Bob stayed sober after meeting Bill and remained sober until his passing.

The book project, as it was known to the New York alcoholics, was rejected by the Akron alcoholics primarily because they felt it was a money making scheme contrived by the New Yorkers, especially Bill and Hank. In fact, Bill kept Dr. Bob in the dark for some time about his work on the book. Eventually, Bill convinced Dr. Bob of the importance of having a book and asked Dr. Bob to spearhead the effort to convince the Akron alcoholics of its value.

Another interesting fact was Bill Wilson's break with the New York Oxford Group. As Bill was working on the chapter "There Is A Solution", it became obvious to him that the Oxford Group's requirement for membership insisting that "a new recruit must remove from his life other sins such as hatred, adultery and others which frequently accompany alcoholism" and that unless he will do this absolutely, he could not be a part of the Oxford Group. Bill felt that this would exclude many alcoholic non-believers, agnostics, atheists. Bill felt there needed to be a more tolerant approach, one that would allow a person to acknowledge his own "higher power" concept. In addition, the Oxford Group was a Christian movement that relied heavily upon the New Testament. Again, Bill felt this put too much emphasis on religion and not enough emphasis on a solution for alcoholism that worked. So Bill broke with the Oxford Group in New York some time well before the Akron alcoholics began meeting on their own. Schaberg attributes part of the

delay in Akron with Dr. Bob not wanting to offend Henrietta Seiberling who was a strong advocate of the Oxford movement.

One final comment concerns Bill's story of his meeting with Ebby. In Bill's version, the two men met in Bill's kitchen, just the two of them. It's a very compelling story that in fact is a myth. Ebby himself explained in great detail that the actual event included several other people including Bill's wife. But Bill, in writing his story, felt that the myth would have much stronger appeal to suffering alcoholics than adding a lot of other information. So the myth stuck. There are other examples in this rich history of the Writing of the Big Book worth reading if you have the time and money to purchase the book.
