Real Friends

How an AA member’s friendships became more than just golf buddies.

How often have you heard a newcomer share at a meeting that, since he joined AA, most of his old friends stopped coming around and that he thought that he was losing them? Sometimes this may be distressful and may cause a person to question whether the sacrifice is worth it.

Sometimes the word “friend” is misunderstood. We often refer to the people we are associated with as friends. Some will say that you can count on one hand, the true friends you will have in a lifetime. So where do these associates/acquaintances come in?

Played golf for about 35 years and had many so called “golfing friends.” but when the round of golf was over, we put our clubs in the car and went our separate ways. Fishing was the same. When we finished fishing, we put our rod and tackle box in the car and went home.



With these acquaintances, the common denominator was the golf or the fishing. That’s what bound us to each other. I quit playing golf about five years ago and when the common denominator was gone, I seldom saw my old golfing friends except in passing where we exchange pleasantries and again, are on our ways.

Most of the friends I had before I was sober had only one thing in common with me and that was the drinking. Unlike the golf and the fishing, we could drink 24 hours a day if we wanted to. We didn’t need a boat or even a set of clubs to associate with each other. A bottle was all that was necessary, and without it we had very little in common. When the common denominator was gone, trying to hang out with them became awkward for them and for me. I had to accept that reality and let them be. If we have anything else in common we

A Big Book study group saved a life—and went on to save many more

I remember first getting into AA—all those sayings, the cliches, the collected wisdom squeezed into aphorisms and short quips. If you were anything like me, they probably irritated you a bit. At the same time, their usefulness was not lost on me. Staggering into my first meeting, hungover and in pain, my brain really couldn't handle much in the way of sophisticated thinking. So, thank God AA has those short, pithy sayings. As a raw newcomer, one can find the whole program in them.

I do remember one from early on that really troubled me. "Some have to die, so that others may live."

Of course, this remains a difficult idea to accept, but I understand its wisdom now. Time in the program, unfortunately, has revealed its truth. Time in the program has also shown a way to extract goodness and positivity from such an occurrence, hard as that might be to believe.

In my experience, AA has given me a program that comes in two basic parts. The first part: we learn how not to drink. The second part: we learn how to live. My first year was mostly devoted to learning how not to drink. Since then, stage two, I've worked on how to live.

A couple years into sobriety, I realized it was time to grow my program. I got with a sponsor and began working a new set of Steps. I had some areas in life I wanted to improve upon, mainly my marriage. Not long after I started, a person I knew, but not well, randomly

invited me to join a Big Book study. It was informal; a collection of eight or nine men, who were getting together to read the Book. They met on a weekly basis, read a few pages, and then discussed it, their lives, and their programs.

I came in on the second or third get-together. There was a tremendous mix of sobriety at the table, everyone from inside six months on up to thirty-five or so years. There was a lot of insight and experience. The formula was simple. As one of the guys, a white-haired, smiling but serious-minded gentleman, said: "We read the Book. When the Book tells us to do something, we do it!" I thought this summed it up better than anything I ever heard. When the Book tells us to do something, we do it.

A very quiet young man sat at the table. I'd seen him at meetings before, we talked a few times, but not much. It was obvious, though, he was in a lot of pain. As another old-timer at the study mentioned, he was "the walking dead." That random person who invited me, and that smiling, white-haired gentleman with thirty-plus years, those two alcoholics put the Book study together. They did it, because that young man, who was in so much pain, had just lost the woman he loved. She succumbed to the disease, in a short time too, never making it to her thirtieth birthday. I found out later that the guy who invited me to participate in the study, had gone to his sponsor, the white-haired gentleman, and told him of the young man. He was worried for him, that he was standing at a fork in the road and was seriously at risk of choosing the same path as the young woman.

"Well," said the old-timer, "Let's start a Big Book study for him. We'll get some guys together, read the book every week, and work a set of Steps."

That we did. And some years later, we still get

together every week, share

our stories and our program and try to help each other stay honest. The cast of characters sitting around the table has changed. Well, most of them. A few of us originals still sit there. Over the years, we've laughed and roared, cried hard, shared love, compassion, and experience. In a word, it has been magnificent. Some have dropped out along the way. New people have come in.

And that young man, "the walking dead?" He still pulls up a seat and joins us every week. Here's another one of those sayings I remember from early on: "Stick around for the miracle." And hey, sometimes, the miracle is seeing someone else get better.

I cannot emphasize how powerful and true this is. Perhaps no other thing has given me as much joy as watching a woman or man, those "walking dead," come to life, regain their color and happiness, and learn to live life. It really, truly, is a miracle.

I'll never forget that young woman who died from the disease. It's strange, since I never met her. But I am living her legacy—as are the others who sit at the Big Book study. I would not be where I am today without her. As for the others in the group, they, too, honor her memory every week as they put in the time and work to become better husbands, fathers, friends and coworkers.

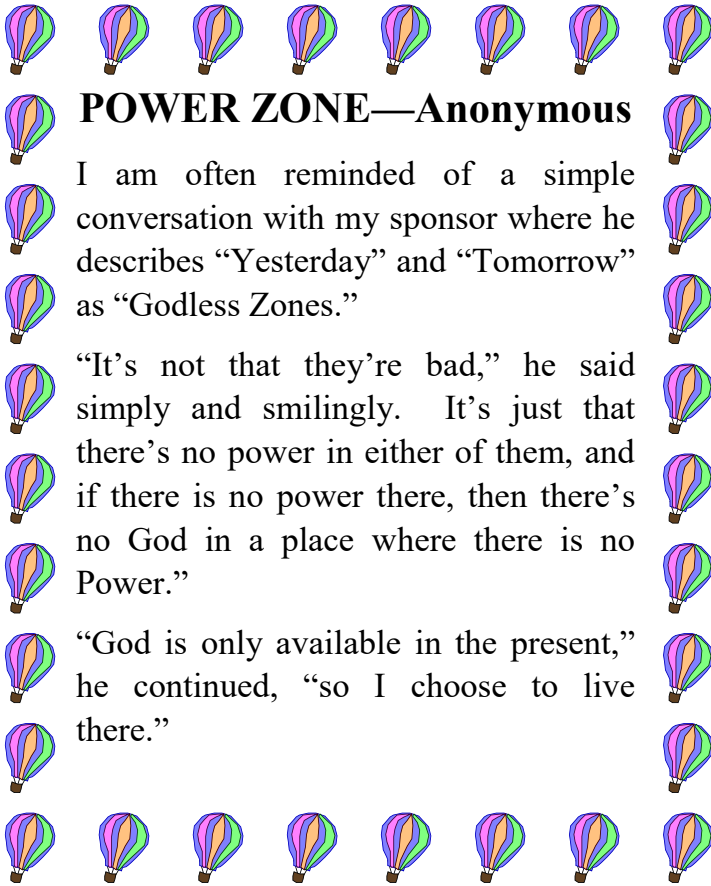
